Moore argued that Defoe's interest in subjects such as "seafaring" and criminals shows that *A General History* falls squarely into his repertoire. Moore posited that not only could other works be used to confirm that Defoe wrote *A General History*, but that *A General History* could be used to endorse his authorship of those same works. Another point that Moore counted on to validate his claims was that many authors, to include historians, had used *A General History of the Pyrates* as a source of information for their own writings.
