Identification of Sensory-based Subgroups in Children with Autism Spectrum Disorder Tessa Hesse 2019
Sensory processing features are highly prevalent in persons with an autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Understanding the sensory-based ASD phenotype is complicated by the individual differences in sensory processing that are exhibited by children with ASD. Research has moved toward an individualized approach to sensory features within the ASD population by investigating sensory sub-profiles based on shared sensory patterns. However, the majority of studies examining sensory-based subgroups in the ASD samples have focused on young children and lack similar clinical control group such as those with ADHD. Further, the bulk of these studies use the same measure (Short Sensory Profile; SSP; McIntosh, Miller, Shyu & Dunn, 1999) that may fail at capturing the full realm of atypical sensory hyper- and hypo-responsivity in the ASD population. Last, few studies have attempted to align sensory subgroups in ASD samples with cognitive and behavioral characteristics. Therefore, the current dissertation sought to identify sensory-based subgroups within an adolescent sample of children with ASD (aged 10-18 years) and the extent to which sensory-based subgroups were significantly different from age and IQ matched clinical (ADHD) and control groups. Data on atypical sensory features was derived via caregiver report using the Sensory Profile (SP; Dunn, 2014). The relationship of these subgroups to social deficits, ASD symptomology, attention, executive functioning, internalizing and externalizing behavior, hyperactivity, functional skills, positive traits was explored using caregiver report from the Behavior Assessment System for Children and the Conners (Conners, 2008). Academic Achievement was measured using the reading and math subscales of the Wechsler Individual Achievement Test-III (WIAT; Wechsler, 2009). Cluster analysis revealed four unique sensory-based subgroups in the ASD sample: High Threshold Moderate Avoiding (MTHR1); Moderate Sensory Features (MSF2); Mixed Threshold Passive Responder (LTMR3), and Pervasive Sensory Features (PSF4). Results revealed little evidence of a valid 4-cluster solution in the analyses of the data for the ADHD and typical samples, supporting the concept of a unique sensory-based ASD phenotype. The four sensory subtypes varied on social and behavioral characteristics, however no differences in academic achievement was found across clusters. In sum, the results of four sensory profiles in the ASD group alone validate the four sensory-based cluster solution found in previous ASD subgrouping studies (Ausderau et al., 2014, Lane, Molloy & Bishop, 2014; Tomchek, Huebner & Dunn, 2018). Previous findings were extended to an adolescent sample, and the occurrence of similar subtypes in a clinically similar ADHD control group was not supported. This study made a unique contribution in that it utilized the Sensory Profile 2 to measure sensory features and patterns of sensory responding to examine

subgroups or clusters in an ASD sample. Some of which have yet to be studied both in reference to sensory responding in children with ASD and across sensory-based subgroups in ASD.

EXAMINING OROFACIAL SOMATOSENSATION DIFFERENCES IN ADULTS WITH AND WITHOUT ADHD. Farlah Cadely 2018 Individuals with attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) have reported secondary symptoms such as speech problems, somatosensory impairments, and sensory processing deficits. Current research efforts to assess these symptoms have focused on children with ADHD. The purpose of this

study was to investigate the relationship of these secondary symptoms in adults with ADHD compared to age-matched controls. Twenty adults with ADHD and 20 age-matched adults without ADHD were recruited for this study. All participants provided a speech sample, completed bilateral lip and tongue somatosensory assessments, and completed the Adult/Adolescent Sensory Profile (AASP). Differences between groups were assessed using independent t-tests. Although individuals with ADHD demonstrated increased reading time, decreased reading accuracy, and decreased tactile detection and discrimination abilities; none reached the level of significance. Adults with ADHD reported significantly more sensory under- and over-responsivity behaviors. Correlational analyses were used to assess the relationship between reading time and accuracy, 2-pt discrimination, tactile detection and discrimination, and prevalence of sensory under- and over-responsivity behaviors in adults with ADHD. Decreased two-point discrimination abilities in left tongue and right lip were correlated with the speech measures: passage time ($r(40) = 0.333, p = .036$) and passage errors made ($r(40) = -0.317, p = .046$), respectively. Sensory over-responsivity was correlated with two of the somatosensory measures: tactile detection left tongue ($r(37) = 0.341, p = .039$) and tactile discrimination right tongue ($r(37) = 0.341, p = .039$). These results suggest adults with ADHD over respond to stimuli as a result of decreased sensitivity.
