community despite the mobility and dispersion of its members; how its forms of sociability fed into the development of robust transatlantic commercial networks; and how the day-to-day experience of trade was translated into the sphere of Spanish imperial politics of commercial reform based on religious-ethnic toleration and the liberalization of trade. A microhistory, *A Nation Upon the Ocean Sea* contributes to our understanding of the broader histories of capitalism, empire, and diaspora in the early Atlantic.
