Es a los libros para jóvenes a los que más tiempo y esfuerzos dedica como lector y crítico, o como investigador y profesor, con estudios y artículos e impartiendo cursillos y ponencias, además de como autor. También con ellos ha cosechado algunos premios: el Lizardi de literatura infantil en euskera en 1985 y el Leer es vivir en 1997. Además de su labor docente, imparte cursos y colabora en publicaciones y medios de comunicación en torno a la literatura infantil y juvenil.

In the Butterfly and the Traffic Light, Jerusalem is seen upon a hill as only it can be in legend, and America is said not to have cities scarred by battles.
