Convergent Evolution George R. McGhee 2011 An analysis of convergent evolution from molecules to ecosystems, demonstrating the limited number of evolutionary pathways available to life. For each species example, he provides an abbreviated list of the major nodes in its phylogenetic classification, allowing the reader to see the evolutionary relationship of a group of species that have independently evolved a similar trait by convergent evolution. McGhee analyzes the role of functional and developmental constraints in producing convergent evolution, and considers the scientific and philosophical implications of convergent evolution for the predictability of the evolutionary process.
