Matisse Volkmar Essers 2012 The Fauvist: Brilliant color, simple forms, and purity of expression are the hallmarks of Matisse's work Henri Matisse (1869-1954) is known not only as one of the most important French painters of the 20th century but also as co-founder and leading exponent of Fauvism. His work reflects an ongoing quest for the expressive power of pure, brilliant colors and simple forms; as a result, the realistic presentation of nature often retires to a secondary position. For Matisse, color did not serve as a tool for the expression of subjective feelings, but rather became the equivalent of light itself: it functioned as a pure medium in the creation of an autonomous pictorial space: "Out of my fruitful work with discovered tones there must emerge a vital color harmony, a harmony that is analogous to a musical composition." As a creative artist, Matisse was not only a painter, but also experimented with other materials: he produced glass windows and theater designs and created significant sculptures in bronze, ceramic and clay. In old age, confined to a wheelchair, he created collages with colored paper, glue, and scissors: his famed gouache cut-outs. Dalí. Les Vins de Gala 2017-10 Tras la estela (o las pinzas de langosta) del fenómeno superventas de Salvador Dalí *Les dîners de Gala*, TASCHEN presenta una continuación vitivinícola con el mismo nivel de sensualidad y surrealismo: *Los vinos de Gala*. Este libro, una perspectiva daliniana sobre los placeres de la uva y un objeto de coleccionista muy codiciado, clasifica los vinos "según las sensaciones que provocan en lo más profundo de nuestro ser". Mediante métricas eclécticas como el método de producción, el peso y el color, este volumen presenta los vinos del mundo en clasificaciones tan innovadoras y dalinianas como "Vinos voluptuosos", "Vinos de lo imposible" y "Vinos de luz". Con gran profusión de imágenes, el libro incluye más de 140 ilustraciones de Dalí. Muchas de ellas son auténticas obras de arte, entre las que se cuentan varios desnudos clásicos, todos ellos recreados con los consiguientes toques provocativos y surrealistas, y *El Ángelus* de Jean-François Millet, una de las piezas de referencia de Dalí durante décadas. El artista incluyó también una obra que actualmente está considerada como una de las mejores de su última fase "mística nuclear", *El sacramento de la Última Cena* (1955), que sitúa la emblemática escena bíblica en un dodecaedro traslúcido ante un paisaje costero catalán. En esa etapa, Dalí era un devoto católico cautivado a un tiempo por la ciencia, la ilusión óptica y la era atómica. La primera parte está dedicada a los "Diez vinos del divino", una breve descripción de diez importantes regiones vinícolas, mientras que en la segunda se presenta su revolucionaria clasificación del vino basada en la experiencia emocional, en lugar de tomar como referencia la geografía o la variedad. Más que de un listado prescriptivo, se trata de un manifiesto extravagante y fluido en favor del sabor y la sensación, un tratado multisensorial y un documento inmenso de la obra de la última etapa de Dalí, en la que el artista reflexionó sobre sus influencias formativas y perfeccionó su propio legado cultural. Vienna 1900 Wien Janina Nentwig 2019-08-30 Vienna around 1900 - a fascinating period in which the metropolis on the Danube became an important center of modernity. Historicism, art nouveau and expressionism, were the defining styles, all of which resonated with a touch of typical Viennese morbidity. Artists such as Gustav Klimt, Koloman Moser and Josef Hoffmann were united in their dream of forging a Gesamtkunstwerk, in which not only art, architecture and crafts, but also art and life itself were combined.

Ernst Haeckel Rainer Willmann 2017 Ernst Haeckel (1834–1919) was a German-born biologist, naturalist, evolutionist, artist, philosopher, and doctor, who spent his life researching flora and fauna from the highest mountaintops to deepest ocean. A vociferous supporter and developer of Darwin's theories of evolution, he denounced religious dogma, abandoned an early career in medicine, authored philosophical treatises, gained a doctorate in zoology, and coined scientific terms which have passed into common usage, including ecology, phylum, and stem cell. Haeckel's colossal legacy has fascinated, confounded, and polarized generations. But what was at the heart of his extraordinary life's work? Rather like his intellectual forebear, Alexander von Humboldt, Haeckel was motivated not only to discover but also to explain. To do this, he created hundreds of detailed drawings, watercolors, and sketches of his findings which he published in successive volumes during the 20th century, including several marine organism collections and the majestic *Kunstformen der Natur* (Art Forms in Nature), which could serve as the cornerstone of Haeckel's entire life project. Like a meticulous visual encyclopedia of living things, Haeckel's work was as remarkable for its graphic precision and meticulous shading as for its understanding of organic evolution and cellular development. From bats to the box jellyfish, lizards to lichen, and spider legs to sea anemones, he emphasized the essential symmetries and order of nature, and found biological beauty in even the most unlikely of creatures. The prints not only furthered the study of natural history but also influenced generations of 20th-century artists and architects, from the

emerging proponents of Art Nouveau to architects such as Hendrik Petrus Berlage, whose Amsterdam Commodities Exchange was inspired by Haeckel's illustrations. In this book, we celebrate the scientific, artistic, and environmental importance of Haeckel's work, with a collection of prints from several of his most important tomes on marine biology, including *Die Radiolarien*, *Monographie der Medusen*, *Die Kalkschwämme: eine Monographie*, and *Kunstformen der Natur*. At a time when biodiversity is increasingly threatened by human activities, the book is at once a visual masterwork, an underwater exploration, and a vivid reminder of the precious variety of life.
