Il Vesuvio - un vulcano nella letteratura e nella cultura Verena Lindtner 2008
Diploma Thesis from the year 2007 in the subject Romance Languages - Italian and Sardinian Studies, grade: 1,0, University of Vienna (Romanistik), language: Italian, abstract: Die Arbeit 'Il Vesuvio - un vulcano nella letteratura e cultura' versucht, den Einfluss des Vesuvs auf Poeten, Schriftsteller, Regisseure und Musiker zu analysieren. Es existieren unzählige Dokumente, Reiseberichte, Gedichte und Romane aus unterschiedlichen Epochen, die vom Vesuv erzählen. Warum aber erregt er so viel Aufsehen und begeistert seit Jahrhunderten Künstler aus aller Welt? Die Faszination des Vesuvs hat zwei Gesichter: einerseits wird er als "Zerstörerberg" bezeichnet, andererseits gilt er als der Schöpfer einer unverwechselbaren Naturlandschaft. Im Jahre 1836 schreibt Giacomo Leopardi das Gedicht 'La ginestra, o il fiore del deserto'. Er beschreibt darin die grausame Natur, die den Menschen immer wieder in seine Grenzen verweist, aber auch die Widerstandskraft des Ginsters, an der sich der Mensch ein Beispiel nehmen soll. Curzio Malaparte beschreibt in seinem Roman 'La pelle' (1949) die Situation in Neapel im Jahre 1944. Doch nicht nur der Krieg und seine Folgen sind Bestandteil des Romans, sondern auch der letzte Ausbruch des Vesuvs. Der Autor stellt diesen als Strafe Gottes dar: die Bewohner der sündigen Stadt müssen für den Sittenverfall büßen. Einen völlig anderen Zugang bieten die Verfilmungen des Romans 'Die letzten Tage von Pompeji' (1834) von Edward George Bulwer-Lytton. Diese Arbeit konzentriert sich auf die vier Versionen von Luigi Maggi (1908), Mario Caserini (1913), Carmine Gallone (1926) und Sergio Leone (1959). In allen Fassungen nimmt der Vulkan eine strafende Position ein. Die Bösen müssen büßen und die beiden Liebenden entkommen dem grauenvollen Tod. Das Lied 'Funiculì funiculà' wurde 1880 von Peppino Turco und Luigi Denza komponiert und sollte auf die neue Seilbahn

aufmerksam machen. Es handelt sich um eines der ersten Lieder im neapolitanischen Dialekt und um de

The Last Days of Pompeii Victoria C. Gardner Coates 2012 Destroyed yet paradoxically preserved by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in A.D. 79, Pompeii and other nearby sites are usually considered places where we can most directly experience the daily lives of ancient Romans. Rather than present these sites

as windows to the past, however, the authors of *The Last Days of Pompeii: Decadence, Apocalypse, Resurrection* explore Pompeii as a modern obsession, in which the Vesuvian sites function as mirrors of the present. This lavishly illustrated volume--featuring the works of artists such as Piranesi, Fragonard, Kaufmann, Ingres, Chassériau, and Alma-Tadema, as well as Duchamp, Dalí, Rothko, Rauschenberg, and Warhol--surveys the legacy of Pompeii in the modern imagination under the three overarching rubrics of decadence, apocalypse, and resurrection. *Decadence* investigates the perception of Pompeii as a site of impending and well-deserved doom due to the excesses of the ancient Romans, such as paganism, licentiousness, greed, gluttony, and violence. The catastrophic demise of the Vesuvian sites has become inexorably linked with the understanding of antiquity, turning Pompeii into a fundamental allegory for *Apocalypse*, to which all subsequent disasters (natural or man-made) are related, from the San Francisco earthquake of 1906 to Hiroshima, Nagasaki, 9/11, and Hurricane Katrina. *Resurrection* examines how Pompeii and the Vesuvian cities have been reincarnated in modern guise through both scientific archaeology and fantasy, as each successive cultural reality superimposed its values and ideas on the distant past. An exhibition of the same name will be on view at the Getty Villa from September 12, 2012, through January 7, 2013; at the Cleveland Museum of Art from February 24 through May 19, 2013; and at the Musée national des beaux-arts du Québec from June 13 through November 8, 2013.
