Bach to Smetana who wrote for them. Based on careful study of primary sources - musical compositions, patents, memoirs and diaries, and unfettered access to historical instruments themselves--Rice's expert presentation is nothing short of exhaustive. *From the Clarinet d'Amour to the Contrabass* will engage all who love the clarinet and its music.
