Plume Kathleen Flenniken 2015-01-01 The poems in Plume are nuclear-age songs of innocence and experience set in the "empty" desert West. Flenniken observes her own resistance to facts: "one box contains my childhood / the other contains his death / if one is true / how can the other be true?" The book's personal story and its historical one converge with enriching interplay and wide technical variety, introducing characters that range from Carolyn and her father to Italian physicist Enrico Fermi and Manhattan Project health physicist Herbert Parker. As a child of "Atomic City," Kathleen Flenniken brings to this tragedy the knowing perspective of an insider coupled with the art of a precise, unflinching, gifted poet. The Biology of Deer Robert D. Brown 2012-12-06 The first International Conference on the Biology of Deer Production was held at Dunedin, New Zealand in 1983.
