Alice Neel: The Art of Not Sitting Pretty Phoebe Hoban 2021-08-10 "Neel emerges as a resolute survivor who lived by her convictions, both aesthetically and politically." –Publisher's Weekly Phoebe Hoban's definitive biography of the renowned American painter Alice Neel tells the unforgettable story of an artist whose life spanned the twentieth century, from women's suffrage through the Depression, McCarthyism, the civil rights movement, the sexual revolution, and second-wave feminism.
