**From Relentless Hope to Realistic Hope** Trevor S. Alleman 2019 This dissertation presents an examination of the clinical problem of masochism from two main perspectives: 1) psychodynamically, as a defense against both grief/loss (Stark, 2000) and narcissistic injury (Cooper, 2008; Stolorow, 1975), and 2) developmentally, as an attachment-related failure to maintain a "mentalizing self" (Fonagy & Target, 2006). Masochism is an enigmatic term that has been broadly defined as the "repetition of abuse, either through self-abuse perpetrated by an internalized abusive object, or via the perpetuation of abusive relationships" (Blizard & Bluhm, 1994, p. 389). In this paper the emphasis is on more florid manifestations of masochism associated with borderline personality organization (Kernberg, 1963) and severe deficits in mentalizing. Mentalizing, a uniquely human capacity that develops in the

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context of attachment relationships, is the imaginative ability to understand behavior in terms of intentional mental states, such as thoughts, feelings, wishes, and desires (Fonagy & Target, 1996). This capacity emerges in the context of a secure attachment relationship in which the infant comes to attribute intentionality to mental states, setting the stage for affect regulation and reflective functioning (Fonagy, Gergeley, Jurist, & Target, 2002). This dissertation examines the clinical problem of masochism in order to illustrate how mentalization-based interventions were helpful in a long-term psychotherapy with a severely traumatized man. A treatment analysis serves to illustrate some of the conceptual and technical issues that are raised in the literature review section.
