The story traces St. Galgano's life from his early youth and sinful years, his conversion at the hands of St. Michael the Archangel, and the circumstances by which he became a hermit on Mt. Siepi. Then, the events of his holy life, his death and burial, as well as a description of what the abbey of St. Galgano looked like. The author, Galetti, even adds the testimony of miracles associated with Galgano's head, a relic preserved in Siena.
