The Life and Times of Giuseppe Verdi Jim Whiting 2005-03 Giuseppe Verdi was born in obscurity in a tiny Italian village in 1813. When he died in 1901, hundreds of thousands of people turned out to pay their respects to the man whom many people consider as the best opera composer of all time. His career spanned more than half a century and included such successes as *Rigoletto*, *La Traviata*, *Il Trovatore*, *Otello*, *Falstaff*, and *Aida*, the most often-performed work at New York's Metropolitan Opera.
